Your West Zone

The West Zone around Station Road contains sites which have made Yate what it is today. The Railway Station was opened in 1844 as part of the Bristol and Gloucester Railway. In addition, Parnall's and Newman's factories created many jobs in the local area from the inter-war period onwards. However, during 1941, the Parnall Aircraft works was bombed by the Luftwaffe with 55 casualties.

Many of the buildings in the St. Mary's part of Yate date back hundreds of years!


In the West Zone you will also find:

Your South Zone

The South Zone consists of a number of historical sites. Farming has always been important in Yate;

It has contributed to the local economy for many centuries. From the 12th century farmers used

various local markets. The South Zone also includes surviving buildings such as Stanshawes Court (below right) and Ridgewood (below left) from the Victorian period.

Key features in this area include:

- -Sea Stores
- -Cottage Hospital (surviving building)
- -Iron Works

Your North Zone

The North Zone is characterised by features from the late Victorian period and the early to mid-twentieth century. Mining was a significant local industry that dominated this area. A thriving, working class community grew up in this part of Yate. Key features covered in this area include:

- -North Road mining community, buildings and landscape (below, top).
- -Yate Parish Church and Lawns House (below, middle)
- Former Farming landscape/buildings such as Goose Green Farm (bottom)
